Parish Council Report - Summer 2018 Phil Williams, Chair, Little Dewchurch Parish Council.

The Parish Council has met regularly this year and there have been a couple of significant changes. Firstly, James Murphy tendered his resignation as Chair of the Parish Council and I would like to thank him for all his hard work during his time at the helm. He has ensured the smooth running of the Council and seen through, among other things, implementation the LDNP along with other members of the committee. James' guidance in the last few years has been invaluable and I hope that he can continue his good work.

Secondly, we welcome Sue Daynes onto the Parish Council and with her experience I feel she will be a very valuable additional member. The Circular Walks Booklet has now been finished and is available for distribution. It is a replacement for the booklet published in 2007 and all households in the parish are eligible for a free copy. Some people have already received theirs and it seems very popular. If you would like a copy, then e-mail me on philip.williams43@btopenworld.com with your address and I can drop one in to you.

On a similar theme, as footpaths officer for the parish, I will be walking all the paths in the next month or so and although all the footpaths and stiles seem to be passable at the moment, we are entering a period where they can become overgrown very quickly. Local landowners are very good at maintaining the network and repairing stiles when it is needed and I would anticipate that that excellent work will continue.

The other concern is that of dogs being allowed to run free on farmland when being walked and this can have detrimental effects on livestock for a variety of reasons. Please can owners keep dogs under control and clear up after them if necessary.

For the more energetic of you, Bob Mason and myself are doing a walk for the Herefordshire Walking Festival on 20th June. If you would like to book a place on that walk or indeed any of the multitude of organised walks during that week, go to the Herefordshire Walking Festival website. We are still chasing monies owed to the parish through a section 106 Agreement for highway, transport and the playing field improvements. Movement on this is glacial but we will get the money out of this proverbial stone eventually for the benefit of the community.

Potholes on the roads are a continuing problem, not just here, but countywide. If you wish to report a problem, and who wouldn't, go to, myaccount.herefordshire.gov.uk/report-a-pothole or phone 01432 261800, and it will be put on the system.

Another ongoing issue is that of parking on Church Lane at the junction of Court Close. We had Ruth Sullivan from Herefordshire Housing attend one of our meetings and we expressed our concerns about the issue. Also, Jane Lisle, Dean Cholmondeley and Bob Mason met Bruce Evans from Highways to explore ways forward. The grass area previously identified for extra parking is not a viable option due to cost and work is continuing to eliminate the problem of parking on the junction which is dangerous and causes damage to neighbouring property.

The other matter is that of safe parking at the school at drop off times. It must be difficult for parents when it is busy, the access around there is no good, but the yellow lines and pavements are there for a reason and we are working with the school to deter inconsiderate and potentially dangerous parking.

We are also in the process of upgrading the Parish website. At the moment it is a Google site with very limited capacity and as more and more things need to be put on, not least new data protection regulations, it needs to be changed. Ali Sherlock has given us a couple of options and change is imminent.

Finally, thank you to all the people who take part in all sorts of organisations in the village and there are a few. From the LDSC, whist drives, Flicks in the Sticks, Facebook page, the Church, village hall committee, Over 60's, the parish magazine itself and any others that I'm sure I've missed. The village is a better place for having you whether you are involved regularly or organise single events. If anyone else would like to get involved in whatever group takes their fancy you would be a welcome addition.

CAR PARKING OPPOSITE THE ENTRANCE TO COURT CLOSE

Little Dewchurch Parish Council (LDPC) has received a number of letters and comments expressing concern at the danger caused by cars being parked opposite the entrance to Court Close.

Parking opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space, contravenes rule 243 of the Highway Code.

Besides having caused damage to vehicles and property, it is our view that parking here risks causing a serious accident.

We therefore request that residents and their guests do not park their vehicles opposite road entrances. Thank you for your cooperation.

We do appreciate that finding suitable parking spaces can prove difficult for residents and LDPC has explored some possible options. We would welcome any positive suggestions to improve parking

.News from St David's

We're a new benefice!

As from June 1st Little Dewchurch is part of the newly-created benefice of South Wye Rural Parishes, covering the villages and associated hamlets and farms of Little Dewchurch, Ballingham, Holme Lacy and Dinedor, about 1600 people in all. Rev Peter Houghton is the priest in charge of this new benefice. Although we have previously been part of the South Wye Team Ministry, the new arrangement means in fact that little changes in how things happen and what we do, since it formalises what has been happening anyway for the last few years.

We are still searching, with increasing urgency, for a suitable property for the diocese to purchase or rent for Peter's replacement as priest-in-charge. The Church of England does not advertise for his replacement until he formally leaves in early November, so there is bound to be several months' vacancy. Overall responsibility for keeping services going will rest with the Rural Dean Rev Dr Chris Moore, but members of the congregation and our friends from other parishes will bear the brunt of carrying on the work until a new priest is appointed.

Stopping saints slipping

Many people have said how nice the new path looks which we had laid about a year ago. However, if it was wet, it became rather slippery, as several discovered to their discomfort! The company which laid it have now treated it with sharp sand and it seems a lot better! Please let us know however if you still have problems with it.

Thanks on behalf of Christian Aid

During Christian Aid week in May envelopes were distributed around the village and returned at our coffee morning and plant sale on the concluding Saturday May 19th. Many thanks to all those who took the time and trouble to distribute envelopes and organise the Saturday morning. We were pleasantly surprised at the numbers who came, in spite of an event happening in Windsor! A total of £644 (including the tax reclaim from GiftAid donations) was received. Thanks very much to all concerned!

Messy Church

Since Easter we have been discovering together about Jesus' power to heal when amongst other things we lit a small bulb by electricity produced by wires between two potatoes and had a 'healing hands' space where people could be named by writing



to be prayed for. In May we learnt how the Holy Spirit came at the first Pentecost and this included telling the story as a 'pass the parcel' game (Pentecost was the birthday of the church!), making 'flame' crown head-dresses and harnessing the power of the wind by making 'jet balloons' go along a stretched string. So all sorts of interesting and exciting things happen! In June and July, with holidays in mind, we plan to think about mountains and seaside's. Baptism or Confirmation anyone?

It is likely that we are going to have a Confirmation Service at St David's before too long. If anyone who was baptised as a child (christened) is interested in confirming the promises made for them then for themselves, then Confirmation is for you! Ouestion Time at the school

One of the great things about children (especially the ones at the village school) is that they are full of questions. Soon after SATS2 had finished, children in years 5 and 6 wrote down questions about what Christians believe and how they behave. A week later a panel of three of us (myself, David Bland and Sian Mehlmann from St Martin's church) tried to answer them. The questions showed how much the children think and were not always easy ones to answer! During the next few weeks Peter is taking a series of lessons at the school and working with the children to learn together more answers to some of the questions that they raised. If anyone would like a similar Question Time event for adults, perhaps in the village hall or at The Plough, please let me know and we will try to arrange such an event.

VICAR'S VIEW!

HOLIDAYS ARE HERE AGAIN!

Summer is traditionally the time for holidays, and the children at school (and even more the teachers!), look forward to the break. Many of us will be travelling away from home, whether its to visit relatives, lie on a beach or visit historic or scenically beautiful places. At the end of June



I'm off to feed the midges in Scotland, possibly the last time before I need a passport to get across the border!

Most of us enjoy a holiday; it's a chance to break from routine, and try doing something different. We might well wonder why some people come from London to Herefordshire for a few days holiday, whilst some do exactly the reverse! Even if you don't go away, its good to take a break from the usual routine to read that book that's been lying on the shelf for months, visit somewhere local that you've never done before (I've been down here 5 years now and still haven't seen the Mappa

Mundi in real life!), try a new activity or skill or stop to admire and sit in the garden, rather than just endlessly weeding it.

Not everyone might know that the word 'holiday' has evolved from 'Holy Day'. In the Middle Ages, the only days that people had off work were Sundays and important festivals observed by the church, hence 'holy'.

But, to go even further back, holidays all started with God! The story of creation finishes with God taking a day off, the seventh day! This was the basis of the observance by Jewish people of the Sabbath, our Saturday. The early Christians changed to keeping the first day of the week Sunday, as their day of rest to celebrate Jesus' resurrection. Whether its Saturday. Sunday or Friday, as is the case with

Muslims, the idea of taking off one day in seven as 'holy' has deeply embedded itself into life worldwide. At times, such as immediately after the French Revolution, other patterns have been tried such as 1 day in 10, but with lack of success. As with all of life, it makes sense to follow the Maker's Instructions

In the Jewish religion, it was not just the Sabbath which was a holiday, but other annual celebrations to remember significant historical events. When Christianity was adopted as the religion of the Roman Empire, 'holy' days when Christians

remembered special things that happened, like Jesus' birth, death and resurrection, became days off.

Now all my life I've had a struggle with the word 'holy', which really means 'different', but, probably because of my upbringing and the way Sunday was viewed then, my default position when I hear the word is about seriousness, gloom and boredom, with a rather Eeyoreish 'If you're enjoying something you must be doing wrong' mentality. However, I have to keep reminding myself that the holy days celebrated in the Bible by Jews and the first Christians were not only a time to worship God but particularly an opportunity to celebrate, with often feasting, giving presents, music, dancing and doing something special together as a family or group.

Its good that it is much easier to do that these days without disapproval by religious people. God doesn't want us to be workaholics, our bodies and minds and relationships need to be refreshed regularly by breaks from routine. But might some of us be missing out on the opportunity to refresh our spirits by worshipping God regularly?

So, thank God for holidays - and enjoy yours!

Creative Champions

Creative Community Champions (CCC) is an innovative new scheme being rolled out across Herefordshire. Local community groups for older people have been offered the opportunity to borrow toolkits with all the equipment and materials they need to run a creative session for 10 people.

CCC coordinator Josie says "Herefordshire is one of the most rural counties in the UK and we wanted to find a way to support local groups to develop the creative activities they run in their local communities."

Champions attend monthly training sessions with expert mentors who are able to show you how to use all of the equipment in the kits, and how to run a fantastic session. Run by The Creative Ageing project at The Courtyard this programme is free of charge for anyone wanting to run sessions with older people in their community.

"The range of kits is amazing, we've done ceramics, screen-printing and bookbinding! We could never have afforded all this equipment on our own"

Elderflower and Rhubarb Ripple

This recipe was devised specially for this book by Lucia Stuart, author "Eating Flowers". She has used rhubarb to make the ripple effect, but you could easily use blackberries, raspberries or wimberries instead

Ripple

6 Rhubarb sticks cleaned and chopped 5 tablespoons of granulated white sugar Put the rhubarb and sugar into a thick bottom pan with a lid. Place on a slow heat too dissolve the sugar, then simmer for 15 minutes.

Allow to cool





Ice cream

12 sprigs of elderflower blossom stalks removed 300ml double cream 400ml full fat milk 100g caster sugar 6 medium egg yolks

Mix together the milk and cream. Shake the flowers clean and strip them from their stalks and put them too soak in the liquid overnight. Next day strain the mixture into a heavy bottom saucepan with the sugar. Put over a medium heat, dissolve the sugar and bring to the boil. Take the pan off the heat, allow to cool for 10 minutes and then add the egg yolks, stirring vigorously to prevent lumps. Return to the heat and cook slowly, stirring and whipping until the cream turns to a custard thick enough to coat the back of the wooden spoon. Strain the liquid into a plastic tub and put into the freezer.

After 2-3 hours give the ice cream a good whipping, either by hand or with an electric whisk. This will break up any ice crystals. Pop back into freezer for another couple of hours. Before the mixture is almost frozen cut 2 troughs in the ice cream and pour the rhubarb into it. Don't Stir! Pop back into the freezer and when it is completely frozen, scoop it out in balls.
